A Cautionary Tale

A new warning has been announced by the FDA. Previously, they have stated that the sweetener Xylitol was being used in peanut butter and was toxic to dogs. Now the ingredient is being listed under other names. Xylitol is a sweetener that is found in a wide range of products. It might also go by other names, including sugar alcohols, wood sugar, birch sugar, and birch bark extract. Some items that include Xylitol are:

- · Sugar-free sweets and peanut butter
- · Mouthwashes, oral rinses, and toothpastes
- Cough syrups and liquid medicines for adults and children
- Other types of medicines like nasal sprays
- Dietary supplements (like fiber gummies and sleep aids)





Xylitol poisoning can start within 20 minutes!! Signs include:

- Vomiting
- · Decreased activity level
- · Weakness and collapse
- Difficulty walking or standing
- · Shaking or seizures
- Coma
- Liver failure
- · Bleeding problems

XYLITOL poisoning can KILL your dog.

Call your vet, emergency animal clinic, or animal poison control center if you think your dog has eaten a product containing XYLITOL. Every second counts!!

Treatment (only to be administered by a veterinarian) may include inducing your pet to vomit and providing supportive care and medications to stabilize blood sugar and electrolyte levels. Medications may be administered to protect the liver and gastrointestinal tract. Your dog will be monitored for liver enzyme activity, blood clotting, and potassium levels for 2-3 days.



Lottie was born around the beginning of October. Although life started out okay, it soon took an unexpected and dangerous turn. Lottie and her mom and sister were discovered in a cat carrier that had been thrown in a ditch when she was a day or two old. It was a hot day and no food was found near the carrier. Luckily, the carrier was seen by a passerby who knew to call Safe Haven.

Soon mama and babies were taken to a foster home where they were given a safe quiet place to recover from the trauma of their last 24 hours. Everyone was eating with gusto after settling down into their new nest. When they were calm, our volunteer foster checked the kittens over to see if they were boys or girls. At this time she noticed that one of the kitten's back legs seem to be frozen and were sticking out behind her. No other immediate health concerns were seen so the little family was given time to settle in.

When transporting them to Safe Haven to be checked over by volunteer veterinarian, Dr. Barb Roland, it was noticed that mama, Posey, became very agitated when she was placed in a carrier and moved anywhere. As most mother cats do when they feel their kittens are in danger, she scooped up the nearest kitten in her mouth to prepare to run away and hide her. Posey was so scared she was not very gentle with her kittens during times when she was being transported. This became so severe that the kittens and Posey were put in separate carriers after that initial trip to Safe Haven.

Dr. Roland gave all three a thorough examination, specifically checking the legs of the kitten soon to be named Lottie. They seemed a little more relaxed than the day before and Dr. Roland hoped that the "tincture of time" would provide healing and the kitten would develop normally. It is unclear if Lottie had been injured when the crate was thrown in the ditch or whether her mama had done some damage when she panicked.

As Lottie grew and became more active, it became apparent that she was not developing like her sister, Lilibet. She zoomed around her room at the foster's home, but she didn't use her back legs. More examinations were done to check for symptoms of disorders like Swimmer Kitten Syndrome. Since the signs didn't quite line up, a diagnosis still couldn't be decided. Once Lottie was eating solid food, an x-ray was scheduled at Frey Animal Hospital. These x-rays did reveal an injury that had healed. No further improvement was expected for Lottie.

Lottie didn't pay much attention to her diagnosis. She taught herself to climb up on beds and recliners. She discovered all sorts of mischief to get into. She easily kept up with her sister, Lilibet. She is just a happy healthy kitten who gets things done in a different way.

One thing Dr. Roland needed to determine a plan for Lottie's future was to find out if Lottie had control of her bowels and bladder, so she took over fostering her. Since Lottie had been seen playing in the litterbox at her first foster home, Dr. Roland set up a dog crate with a litterbox, food and water. She noticed that Lottie was using the litterbox when she was in the crate but did not go back to the litterbox when she was out playing. So, Dr. Roland ordered some tiny kitten diapers and onesies for playtime. Dr. Roland did notice that Lottie would twitch her tail rapidly when she needed to poop, and she also twitches her legs and clenches her toes, which indicates that the nerves to her legs are damaged but not severed.

It has still been noticed that Lottie is not using her litterbox 100% of the time. Her ideal home would be with someone who has extra time for diaper changes, baths, and laundry that Lottie requires. She will repay you with lots of purrs and snuggles. She is such a happy-go-lucky girl!
